



In-Work Poverty in New Zealand

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 Access to the anonymised data used in this study was provided by Statistics New Zealand in accordance with security and confidentiality provisions of the Statistics Act 1975, and secrecy provisions of the Tax Administration Act 1994.

• The findings are not Official Statistics. The results in this paper are the work of the authors, not Statistics NZ, and have been confidentialised to protect individuals, households, businesses and other organisations from identification.



Overview

- First study to examine the prevalence of, and characteristics associated with, in-work poverty in New Zealand
- IDI: Linking 2013 Census data with monthly data from Inland Revenue and Working for Families
- March 2013: 50,000 out of 725,000 working households live in poverty → in-work poverty rate of 7 percent
- Great variation across several demographic dimension → Prevalence is greatest for our most vulnerable
- Substantial re-distributional effect of Working for Families tax credits and the Accommodation Supplement



Measuring in-work poverty

- Units of analysis for defining both 'work' and 'poverty' → household level
- Poverty:
 - Binary indicator: poverty threshold based on the income distribution of the *whole* population and set at 60 percent of the median monthly net equivalised income
 - Accounting for all income sources on the monthly level
 - OECD scale to equivalise income

• Working:

- 'Population spine': At least one adult in the household is part of the working-age population (aged 18 to 65)
- 'Working': if at least one working-age adult in that household is in employment for seven or more months of the year (April 2012 to March 2013 inclusive)
- Excluding households with self-employed members and pensioner households



Measuring in-work poverty

In-work poverty = proportion of *working* households that fall below the poverty threshold

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


















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

Analysis by gender and children

- 725,313 working households \rightarrow 1,507,986 adults
 - in-work poverty rate at the adult level of 7.2 percent
 - 7.7 percent (59,967 adults) female adults
 - 6.6 percent (47,874 adults) male adults






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- 725,313 working households → 567,069 children aged below 18
 - 10 percent (56,823 children) live in an in-work poor household




In-work poverty rate over time (HLFS)


Region and in-work poverty rate


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


Ethnicity and working status








Occupation






Income sources



Conclusion

- March 2013:
 - 50,000 out of 725,000 working households live in poverty
 - → in-work poverty rate of 7 percent
- Great variation across several demographic dimension
 - → Prevalence is greatest for our most vulnerable
- Substantial re-distributional effect of Working for Families tax credits and the Accommodation Supplement
- Follow-up study on ethnic differences (commissioned by MBIE)



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
